- 6 Discuss the significance of nationalist parties in the UK. [50]
- 7 Compare and contrast contemporary socialist and liberal attitudes towards welfare issues. [50]
- 8 "Gender imbalance is irrelevant in modern UK politics." Discuss. [50]
