2 Read Passage 2A and Passage 2B from the Insert and answer questions **2(a)** and **2(b)**.

(a) Read Passage 2A.

'Anna tells Dido exactly what she wants to hear.' Show how, through what she says and how she says it, Anna encourages Dido's love for Aeneas. **[25]**

(b) Read Passage 2B.

'From the beginning to the end of Book 4, Virgil maintains a wholly sympathetic picture of Dido.' How far do you agree with this view? Discuss with reference to Passage 2B **and** to *Aeneid* 4 as a whole. **[25]**

(a) Read Passage 3A.

Show how, by what he says and how he says it, Propertius emphasises the foolishness of Postumus and the faithfulness of his wife. **[25]**

(b) Read Passage 3B.

What makes Propertius worth reading? From Passage 3B **and** the other poems you have read, answer this question by assessing what you consider to be the most memorable features of his poetry. **[25]**
