Source for Question 1

Conservatism is seen as one of the most influential ideologies in British and European politics. Its origins in British politics date back largely to a reaction against the events of the French Revolution, and, in particular, it was shaped by the writings of Edmund Burke (1729–1797). Ironically, Burke was not a member of the Tory grouping in Parliament, the forerunner to the modern British Conservative Party: he was a Whig, one of the groups that later helped to found the modern British Liberal Party. European conservatism is seen as more reactionary than British conservatism, with many theorists favouring rule by the church and monarchy.
