#### SECTION A: Media

##### 1 Write the text for a broadcast to raise awareness of a social problem.

The Credit Crunch. Businesses, individuals and most of all families have been affected by it. These last few months have been a big worry for some families and made life unbearable with the thought of having to support their families through this tough time.

Unemployment has risen over the past eighteen months because of the credit crunch with families suffering the worst with parents losing jobs and being unable to support their children and home.

A man who recently lost his job in advertising spoke out to BBC today about his redundancy and pressure to keep his family going "I loose my job I've been in for 10 years to suddenly come into work without warning to see my boss telling me I need to go home and I won't be returning. My wife is just a waitress in a local hotel and without my job we can't keep the house alive, but I can't find another job to save us." It isn't only the home Mr Jones is trying to save, also his children "I have a son started university in September, me and my wife always planned on helping our children through education throughout their life, this just cannot happen though, and we still have two more to support."

This is just typical of many stories families have to tell around the country. However not is it only families and adults that are suffering from unemployment in the UK, but newly adults, just leaving school looking for a job, are in a position where they are unable to start a career let alone loose one. A college leaver recently just left Sutton College stated "I've always wanted to work in hospitality, yet I am unable to even get started to work. I know friends who have got lucky and managed to get a job where they can, or they know other friends and family who can help. Their lucky but not all of us have that option and we just have to stay living at home with no hope yet to be able to go anywhere."

Mortgages are also at risk as families are unable to afford the payments with many people having to sell up their beloved homes. Rhys Jones got married earlier this year but he is still living with his parents "We can't get a mortgage and we don't want to waste our money renting. So we have decided to stay at home and save our money because we need to get a big deposit" he told the BBC. This sort of situation can put a big strain on a new marriage and this can affect the divorce rate.

Many other countries are affected by the credit crunch, but Britain is one of the worst. The government has tried to do something about it for example taking tax off clothes and other items, but it hasn't worked. The government is in debt and can't really afford to help anyone.

This is the style of life people have to put up with at this time; however lets hope that things get better for everyone in the future.

We have to wait for our parents to go out to go to someones house and get together with our friends. Luckily we can use Orange Wednesday to get to see the latest films.

## Commentary

*The writer engages the audience and is generally in control of the material. Writing has a sense of direction and shows evidence of adapting form and style to suit different purposes. There is some variety of vocabulary and sentence structure for effect, but these sometimes lack precision. The questions are addressed in a mainly relevant way, demonstrating an understanding of task and purpose. Spelling of complex regular words is secure and punctuation is usually used accurately for ending sentences, although is less secure within sentences. (A good middle response).*
