My dream holiday is in Ibiza, BECAUSE there aren't any teachers or parents to push me around.

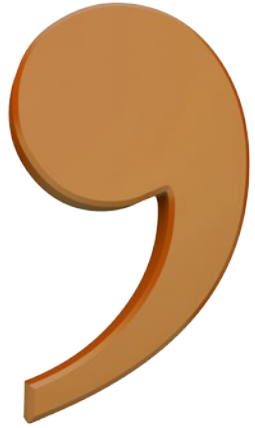
Please, Mrs Able, gimme a packet of crisps.

tells you what happens first

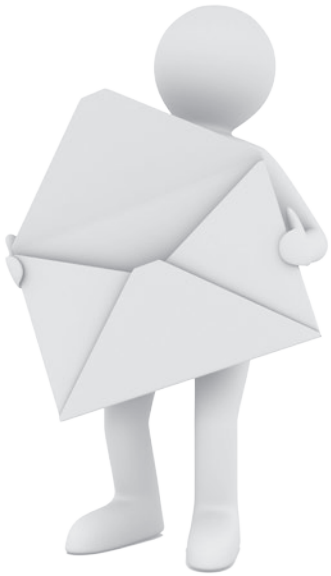


gets exciting and
