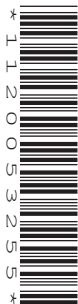

Source for Question 1

Environmental policy provides a good case study of the complexity of the legislative process in the USA. Legislative proposals from the White House have faced great opposition from the Congress. Bipartisan support for new controls has greatly declined and proposed legislative amendments consistently threaten to undermine the Clean Air Act (1990). Furthermore, business interest groups have used their power and influence to campaign against further controls. Even those environmental laws that have been passed by the Congress have been altered by the courts.


