<u>Practical portfolios</u> with supporting contextual research, learners are expected to develop a personal response based on a centre-set or learner-set theme leading to a finished realisation. Learners should carefully <b>select</b> , <b>organise</b> and <b>present</b> work to ensure all four assessment objectives are covered.	The <b>investigation</b> should be coherent, in- depth study that demonstrates the student's ability to construct and develop a sustained line of reasoning from an initial starting point to a final realisation.

<b>Related study</b> Enables learners to demonstrate their ability to communicate knowledge and understanding of art movements, genres, practitioners through a written and where appropriate illustrated component. This written study should be related through context to the learners chosen practical portfolio, it should be guided to a minimum of 1000 words. Discrete assessment criteria provided for ease of assessment.	<ul> <li>Critical written communication will consist of a critical and analytical written piece of a minimum 1000 words continuous prose. It must be presented as a separate piece in writing.</li> <li>Expressions of personal interpretations and conclusions, with clear links between research, analysis and own investigations.</li> </ul>
