Some may say that Islam does not allow Muslims to fully integrate into non-Muslim countries, but due to various evidence this view could perhaps be argued against.</p> <p>Islam as a religion The view that Islam does not allow Muslims to fully integrate into non-muslim countries can be argued against as Islam has successfully migrated into non-Muslim countries such as France and Germany, in according to 2016, the Muslim population integrated in France was 5.7 million, that being 8.8% of the Muslim entire population. And in Germany it was 2.5 million muslim. Through this we can infer that Islam does indeed allow Muslims to fully integrate into non-muslim countries as no problems have risen from this now.</p> <p>On the other hand, it can be debated that Islam does not allow muslims to fully integrate into non-Muslim countries as once this integration has occurred, problems against Islam can</p>

For example, in France again, any type of Islamic religious symbol is banned in schools, as well as no hijabs being allowed to be worn on the beach. This then will conflict with Islamic Muslims as they'll be forced to either side with the Islamic law or the country's laws, which could result in inner and external conflict, and thus suggesting the view that Islam does not allow Muslims to fully integrate into Muslim non-Muslim countries.</p>
