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	(b)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Answers might suggest that it led to Clinton’s abandonment of the Highlands, which was a crucial area • Answers might suggest that it led to the British sending a secret agent to contact American commissioners about ending the war • Answers might consider the international consequences • In dealing with Yorktown answers might suggest that it was a decisive defeat, but Britain still controlled large areas • Answers might suggest that it did not lead to the collapse of the British position • Answers might suggest that it led to Britain discontinuing operations and the public and parliament were reluctant to continue the war <p>Assess the reasons why it was so difficult to find a successor to Washington in 1796.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In arguing that the main reason was the influence and power of Washington, answers might consider that no-one had the skills of Washington who avoided political in-fighting. • Answers might consider his reputation and patriotic prestige. • Answers might consider that he embodied national authority. • Answers might consider that it was Washington who made the Constitution work • Answers might consider Washington’s decision 	20	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • No set answer is expected • At higher levels candidates will focus on assessing the reasons but at level 4 may simply list the reasons • At Level 5 and above there will be judgement about the relative importance of the reasons • At higher levels candidates might establish criteria against which to judge whether Britain lost or America won. • To be valid judgements, claims must be supported by relevant and accurate facts.
