Use of different techniques – e.g. crying baby to gather information.</li> <li>Conduct a physical review of the offices looking at position of monitors and what can be seen and what information can be gathered that could be used in a hack.</li> <li>Employ a third party consultant to examine the policies and procedures and then go undercover to see if they are being implemented as policies that are not being followed are a potential weak point in a system.</li> <li>Monitor/increased/abnormal levels of traffic in key areas, this could be done by installing a firewall and looking at the logs.</li> <li>NOT about actions to take to protect the network.
