

2 Read the following passage and answer the questions.

The philosopher Theophrastus wrote a series of brief, amusing descriptions of the different character types most common in Athens. His third example is the chatterbox.

ό δὲ ἀδολέσχης παρακαθιζόμενος ἀνθρώπῳ τινί ὃν μὴ γιγνώσκει, τούτῳ πρῶτον μὲν τὴν αὐτοῦ γυναῖκα ἄγαν ἐπαινεῖ· εἶτα, ὃ τῆς νυκτὸς εἶδεν ἐνύπνιον, τοῦτο διηγεῖται· εἶτα, ἃ εἶχεν ἐπὶ τῷ δείπνῳ, πάντα διέρχεται. εἶτα δὴ προχωροῦντος τοῦ πράγματος λέγει ὅτι πολὺ κακίονες εἰσιν οἱ νῦν ἄνθρωποι τῶν παλαιῶν, καὶ ὅτι ἄξιοι γεγόνασιν οἱ πυροὶ ἐν τῆ ἀγορᾳ, καὶ ὅτι πολλοὶ ξένοι Ἀθήνησι, καὶ τὴν θάλατταν ἐκ Διονυσίων πλόϊμον εἶναι· καὶ ὅτι εὶ ποιήσειεν ὁ Ζεὺς ὕδωρ πλεῖον, τὰ ἐν τῆ γῆ βελτίω ἔσται, καὶ ὃντινα ἀγρὸν γεωργήσει, καὶ ὅτι χαλεπόν ἐστι τὸ ζῆν, καὶ πόσοι εἰσὶ κίονες τοῦ Ὠιδείον, καὶ 'χθὲς ἤμεσα', καὶ τίς ἐστιν ἡμέρα· καὶ ἐὰν ὑπομένῃ τις αὐτόν, οὺ παύσεται.

(ii)	what has he noticed in Athens?	[2]
(iii)	what does he observe is the case since the Greater Dionysia?	[2]
(f)	καὶ ὅτι εἰ ἔσται (line 6): what do you think the chatterbox means by this remark?	[2]
(g)	καὶ ὃντιν $α ζῆν (lines 6–7): judging by these remarks, what do we learn about:$	
(i)	the chatterbox's occupation?	[1]
(ii)	his attitude to life?	[1]
(h)	καὶ πόσοι ἡμέρα (lines 7–8): what three pieces of information does the chatterbox relay to companion here?	his [3]
(i)	καὶ ἐὰν παύσεται (line 8): what does Theophrastus suggest is the only way to get the chatterbox to stop?	[1]
