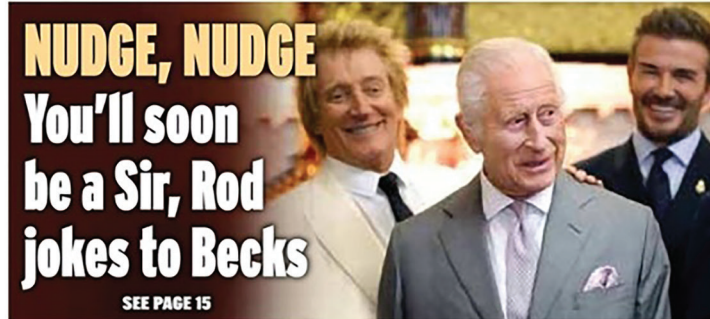
'Strictly Debbie' is Debbie McGee who was on the BBC TV show *Strictly Come Dancing* in 2017. 'Gio' (Giovanni Pernice) was her dance partner on the show. He was suspended from the show in 2024 after allegations about his behaviour. 'Jude' is Jude Bellingham, an England footballer. He had signed a deal with social media influencer Kim Kardashian to model for her clothing website.

TORY AMBITION TO DEPORT 100,000 ILLEGAL MIGRANTS

RISHI Sunak has fired up the election by promising to slash legal migration in half with a Tory plan emerging to deport as many as 100,000 illegal immigrants.

Unveiling his manifesto, the Prime Minister shifted firmly on to the front foot by vowing deportation flights to Rwanda will take off within days if the Conservatives are returned to office.

Tory sources revealed the manifesto plans meant as many as 100,000 illegal migrants could be sent to Rwanda and a series of other countries considered for deportations in "an uncapped scheme". The PM
